

Pupil Premium Funding Allocation 2018/19

The government introduced the Pupil Premium Grant in April 2011. This grant, which is additional to main school funding, is seen by the government as the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between certain groups of children. The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

At Coverack Primary School we aim to support all our pupils. We do this by providing high quality classroom teaching supplemented by interventions to support vulnerable learners as and when required. The governors believe in using this grant to enable all children to enjoy access, participation and achievement within school life, particularly for those identified as disadvantaged, vulnerable or under-achieving, through high quality teaching & learning and resources.

Provision Over this financial year this allocation will be used to support pupils in a number of ways.

- A summer term ‘nurture group’ has been set up to target our vulnerable pupils supporting their social and emotional development. Many of these vulnerable pupils are in receipt of the pupil premium.
- Vulnerable pupils, specifically those in receipt of pupil premium have allocated individual support time as befits their needs with teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Support staff are being used in and out of class to support the learning of children for whom the premium applies, in small group work and 1 to 1. There are focused programmes sometimes daily to support specific needs eg phonics intervention
- Musical instrument classes have been financially supported for pupils for whom the premium applies
- Pupil premium money has been used to support children in being able to attend residential camp
